Abundance, Season and Breeding Status Codes

Abundance:

- C = Common – usually present, relatively easy to find
- U = Uncommon – usually present, but may be difficult to find
- O = Occasional - observed four or more times, but not usually present
- R = Rare - observed one to three times

Seasons:

- p = permanent resident
- s = summer resident or visitor (June–July)
- w = winter resident or visitor (December–February)
- m = spring and/or fall migrant (March–May and/or August–November)

Breeding status:

- * = breeding confirmed (nest found, or adults seen feeding young, since 2000) (40 species)
- + = breeding likely (adult pair or one or more singing males present through June or later at least once since 2000) (18 species)

Note: Status refers to **the Mississippi River gorge area only**. This list includes 191 species of birds, of which 58 are confirmed or likely current breeding species. Several species listed as migrants and/or occurring in summer breed in nearby areas but are not known to breed in the gorge area. Several other species likely bred prior to 2000.



The geographic area covered by this list includes the surface waters of the Mississippi River and adjacent park land **on the west side of the river only** from the Army Corps of Engineers Lock and Dam #1 immediately south of the Ford Bridge north to the 26th Street rail bridge. The list area includes residential areas and the Becketwood Cooperative, Dowling School and Minnehaha Academy Lower and Upper School grounds west to 46th Avenue South from East 46th Street north to East 29th Street as well as residential areas between Seabury Avenue and Dorman Avenue North to the light rail bridge between the University of Minnesota East and West Bank campuses. No residential areas north of East 26th Street are included.
