In face of construction, wildflowers relocated for the summer

This summer, road construction crews are slated to do considerable work on East 18th Street/Highway 291. The project abuts one of Hastings' unique areas, a scientific and natural area (SNA). The SNA is located across from C.P. Adams Park along East 18th Street.

In 2011, the Friends of the Mississippi River wrote a management plan for the site that evaluated it, looked at existing conditions and addressed management issues. Schick noted that it is illegal for people to dig up and take plants from the SNA. This particular project was a preservation effort done with permission from the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources.

The reason SNAs are so protected and efforts are made to preserve them is because they are a sort of natural heritage.

"They are the best remnants, the best representation of what used to be here before we had all our development and housing and agriculture," Schick said. "...We want to protect that."

Left alone, there's a chance that native plants would grow back, but there's also a good chance that non-native and weedy species would grow in. Transplanting the existing plants provides a good foothold for native plants to overcome non-native ones.

Schick said that the replanting is tentatively scheduled for September, but will depend on construction timelines.

About 15-20 volunteers helped plant the seven trees four hybrid elms and three hackberries. The elms grow quickly, "so we'll have shade in a hurry," Mahoney said, while hackberry trees are a hardy variety. Several locust trees are already present around the baseball field.
