Its 72-mile stretch through the Twin Cities, the Mississippi River Corridor Critical Area, is also a national park afforded special protective policies. Local cities are responsible for managing land use and development within it.

At the direction of the Legislature, the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources adopted new science-based rules for the river's designated critical area.

Starting in 2020, each of the 25 cities and townships in our 72-mile metro river corridor will update its ordinance accordingly.

This will be an important tool for city officials and communities who want to shape the river for years to come.
